The geese are back!

First wintering pink-footed geese return to Scottish Wildlife Trust Montrose Basin reserve

Scottish Wildlife Trust staff at Montrose Basin are delighted to report that the first wintering pink-footed geese have arrived back to the reserve having spent the summer months on their breeding grounds in Iceland.

With over 65,000 geese on the Basin at the end of September, last year's record of 51,000 has been well beaten. Numbers are expected to peak around the middle of October.

The geese come into the Basin in the evenings to roost in the safety of the reserve before leaving again at first light when they make their way to surrounding fields where they will spend the day feeding.

As an internationally important site for our wintering population of pink-feet, staff and volunteers must keep a close eye on the number of geese visiting Montrose Basin.

A dedicated team of hardy goose counters will endure the dark, cold winter mornings to monitor the number of geese roosting on the Basin.

Counters are located at specific sites around the Basin and they count the number of geese in the skeins which fly over their heads as they make their way to feed.

For an up-to-date count of the number of pink-footed geese currently on the reserve,

keep an eye on the sightings board in the Visitor Centre.

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Reserve Rarities

The 9 ruddy shelduck which caused a stir during the summer months were last seen on 17th August and a little egret was on the Basin from early August, last seen on 2nd September. A common crane has been recorded on the Basin since 8th August and is believed currently to be in moult.

On 22nd September staff were lucky enough to witness a great skua chasing a sandwich tern across the Basin in front of the Visitor Centre, this is the first confirmed sighting for the Basin and is an excellent record for the reserve.

Other notable sightings include goshawk (01/09), honey buzzard (01/09), little stint (16/09), wheatear (08/08 and 28/09), 2 whinchat on Rossie Island (22/09) and curlew sandpiper have been recorded in small numbers throughout the September.

As reported in the last edition of Basin Bugle, in order to control • Encourage wading birds by improving visibility for vegetation in the Salt Pans, Scottish Wildlife Trust are utilising our very own flock of sheep to graze the site.

Grazing with the flock, which are used on our reserves across Scotland, will:

- Enhance the salt marsh habitat and many transitional swamp communities.
- Maintain high biodiversity within the sward.
- Scottish Wildlife Trust Encourage wildfowl by providing a more palatable sward for grazing.

- predator evasion.
- Encourage breeding waders through overall habitat improvements.
- Encourage waders to feed by muddying pool margins.
